'World Day of Prayer' – Cuba - This day is an invitation for Christians to pause and pray together ecumenically. Each year it recalls our Christian responsibility to be sensitive to the signs of times so that we might bring a more authentically Christian dimension to the concerns of our world, our country, our community.

Cuba - The Cuban woman plays an important role in the society, church and family, although she faces a long chain of suffering and discrimination. The first indigenous Cuban women were trampled and abused by the colonizers. Today there are still patterns of behavior that denote a patriarchal and male chauvinist culture at all levels of social relations.

Women have defended their rights to work and to fight, even on the battle fields, demonstrating their limitless courage and intelligence. In 1869, during the Constituent Assembly, the town of Guáimaro heard the voice of the distinguished fighter for Cuban independence, Ana Josefa Betancourt, who exclaimed, "The time has come to liberate the woman!" Later, in 1923, women began to organize themselves in groups to discuss the problems that affected them and to promote changes that favored their role as women.

After the Revolution in 1959, women were incorporated as an active force in the construction of the new society, broadening the opportunities to improve their scientific-technical and professional training. In 1961, the Federation of Cuban Women was formed by Vilma Espín, a young chemical engineer and leader in the Revolution. This female organization is composed of 4 million Cuban women of all professional categories, qualified technicians, skilled workers and peasants. The Federation maintains its demands in favor of the rights of women, children and the family in general.

In order to achieve the Federation's objectives, a series of measures were proposed to lay the foundations for the satisfactory insertion of Cuban women into the labor force. Among them were the change of the employment system and structure to allow women to overcome cultural, technical and professional obstacles and occupy posts traditionally assigned to men; the diversification of jobs; changes in the Constitution of the Republic and the Labor Code to guarantee equal rights for men and women; and the creation of Daycare Centers for the children of working mothers.

Among the results obtained, it is found that today more than 46% of persons employed in the public sector are women; women constitute 68% of the technically and professionally qualified labor force and 39% are

managers. The percentage of women has increased in all work sectors of the country. Nevertheless, the supremacy of the man is seen in the management positions in some sectors, and the abilities of women are not recognized during elections for key positions in economy, politics and religion, with the excuse being given that their assigned role is that of protagonist in the family.

Fridays during Lent Each Friday of Lent

Here are four things you can do—that anybody can do—to grow closer to Jesus.

- Tell Jesus today and every day that you will do what he wants you to do, say what he wants you to say, and go where he wants you to go. This is what St. John of the Cross called the Nothing Doctrine: nothing comes before Jesus.
- On your way to Mass, and again just before the Scripture readings, ask the Holy Spirit to enlighten your heart and mind through the readings. Pay attention—don't let your mind wander (I've been there). Jesus is speaking to you through His Word.
- Pray after Mass. Spend as long as you can after receiving Him, several minutes at least, praying to Jesus. He is in you. Ask Him what he wants for you. Listen.
- Promise yourself that following Jesus completely starts today, starts this year.

Obtaining an Indulgence

All who enter through the Door of Mercy, whether as a group or individually, will receive abundant grace and an opportunity for a fresh encounter with Christ. The Jubilee year provides for the faithful - living and deceased - a plenary indulgence, under the usual conditions:

- Confession within 8 days
- Celebration of Holy Eucharist with reception of Holy Communion
- Praying the Creed and the Lord's Prayer
- Prayer for the Holy Father and his intentions, for the good of the Church and the entire world
- Praying the Jubilee of Mercy Prayer
- Invoking the Divine Mercy, "Jesus, I trust in You"

Commit to memory the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. Use these as an inspiration for your own life of mercy

THE WORKS OF MERCY

The Corporal Works of Mercy

focus on physical needs:

1. To feed the hungry
2. To give drink to the thirsty
3. To clothe the naked
4. To shelter the homeless
5. To visit the sick
6. To visit the imprisoned
7. To bury the dead

The Spiritual Works of Mercy

centre on spiritual and emotional needs:

1. To instruct the ignorant
2. To counsel the doubtful
3. To admonish sinners
4. To bear wrongs patiently
5. To forgive offences willingly
6. To comfort the afflicted
7. To pray for the living and the dead

Year of Mercy a Way to be Involved - 3

When you look at holy pictures of Jesus, or a crucifix, ask for the awareness of his mercy in your life. Try randomly selecting one each week and putting it into practice:

6. Plan a mini pilgrimage to a local shrine; make an effort along the way to live the corporal work of mercy of "welcoming the stranger" as Christ.
7. Do something kind and helpful for someone who you don't get along with, or who has wronged you.
8. Be mindful of your behavior online. Is that post designed to improve your image ... and leave others feeling bad? Are you hammering people in order to serve your anger and humiliate others?

9. Have Masses said for the living: friends and family members, even strangers you read/hear about, who are having a hard time.

10. Be generous enough to allow someone to help you; people need to feel needed.

Year of Mercy a Way to be Involved - 4

Make a commitment to avail yourself of God's mercy in the great Sacrament of Reconciliation. Here are 7 additional ways to live mercy during the Jubilee Year. Try randomly selecting one each week and putting it into practice:

11) If you didn't mean to be a pain in the neck to someone, admit you were and ask the person to forgive you.

12) Take a tip from Cardinal Timothy Dolan and carry around \$5 Starbucks and McDonald's gift cards for the homeless.

13) Take time in prayer to contemplate the good qualities of someone who is difficult for you. Do the same for each member of your family.

14) Send a card, flowers, gift or note to someone on the six-month anniversary of his or her loved one's death.

15) Offer to babysit for a busy mom to go out and have a couple of hours to herself.

16) Make a meal (or buy a gift certificate) for a mom who's just given birth or adopted a child, or for someone who's just gone through a loss.

17) Hold. Your. Tongue.

Year of Mercy a Wat to be Involved-5

Undertake a "Jubilee Year of Mercy" pilgrimage through the doors taking advantage of the opportunity to acquire a Plenary Indulgence. Try randomly selecting one each week and putting it into practice:

18) Offer to run an errand (groceries, dry cleaning pick-up, dog-walking) for a busy parent or homebound person.

19) If you can't sit down beside a homeless person to talk for a while today, at least send a donation to a ministry that does do this.

20) If you're sharing a treat, take the smaller portion.

21) Memorize the 14 corporal and spiritual works of mercy and show your children what they mean.

22) Instead of losing patience with someone online (or in person), try to hear that person's fear. Ask God for what Solomon asked for: "an understanding heart."

Indulgences Can Ease Souls

To understand mercy we have to understand justice. Sin ruptures communion with our fellow men and with God, and therefore of itself incurs retributive justice. However God's mercy is infinite if there is contrition and amends are made for the wrong that was done. Hence, "the doctrine and practice of indulgences in the Church are closely linked to effects of the sacrament of penance: (CCC, #1471) From the third century, the Church has taught that every sin, mortal or venial, brings with it a penalty, either perpetual or temporal. Theologically, every sin has two effects: the guilt (culpa) for transgressing divine law, and the penalty (poena), its punishment. We will be admitted to the Beatific Vision in heaven and share in the life of the Most Holy Trinity only when we have totally expiated the penalty for our offences committed on earth. According to our Catechism, mortal sin deserves an eternal punishment, but can be pardoned by sacramental confession or an act of perfect contrition. By divine justice, even after the sinner has reconciled with God by confession and absolution, mortal sin incurs a penalty either on earth or in purgatory. Venial sin is a minor contravention which does not deprive us of the state of grace, and incurs

chastisement in purgatory until all penalties are satisfied. To compare with secular law, purgatory is where we pay the "fine" for disobeying God's law. "The forgiveness of sin and restoration of communion with God entail the remission of the eternal punishment of sin, but temporal punishment of sin remains. While patiently bearing sufferings and trial so of all kinds and, when the day comes, serenely facing death, the Christian must strive to accept this temporal punishment of sin as a grace. "He should strive by works of mercy and charity, as well as by prayer and the various practices of penance, to put off complexly the "old man" and to put on the "new man" (CCC, #1473) In seeking to purify oneself of sin and become holy with the help of God's grace, we are not alone. Baptized God's children, we are joined in Christ and through Christ to the life of all Christian brethren "in the supernatural unity of the Mystical Body of Christ, as in a single mystical person" (CCC#1474). Therefore there is a "perennial link of charity" between the Church militant (on earth), the Church suffering (in purgatory, awaiting full union with God), and the Church triumphant (in heaven). The holiness of one profits the others, and recourse to the community of saints "lets the contrite sinner be more promptly and efficaciously purified of the punishments for sin" (CCC, #1475).

The Church, as the minister of redemption, "dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints" (CCC #1471). The redemptive works of Jesus and all the saints accumulate infinite merits that, applied to our sins, remit the temporary penalties, and these spiritual goods and merits of the communion of saints is also called the mystical "treasury of the Church" (Thesaurus Ecclesiae) in which, by baptism, we are all entitled to share. As the Catechism explains (#1476-7): "In Christ, the Redeemer Himself, the satisfactions and merits of His Redemption exist and find their efficacy" and the treasury also included the prayers and good works of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the saints, and all those who "have followed in the footsteps of Christ the Lord and by His grace have made their lives holy and carried out the mission in the unity of the Mystical Body." These were offered so that the whole of mankind could be set free from sin and attain communion with the Father. St. Paul said: "I find my joy in the suffering I endure for you. In my own flesh I fill up what is lacking in the suffering of Christ for the sake of His Body, the Church" (Col 1:24). The Spiritual goods of the treasury can never be exhausted and are pristine in their value before God. Through the Church, who has the power of binding and loosing granted her by Christ Jesus, indulgences enable baptized Christians to access this spiritual treasury "to obtain from the Father of mercies the remission of the temporal punishments due for their sins.

"Thus the Church does not want simply to come to the aid of these Christians, but also to spur them to works of devotion, penance, and charity" (CCC #1478).

"Since the faithful departed are also members of the same communion of saints, one way we can help them is to obtain indulgences for them so that the temporal punishments due for their sins may be remitted" (CCC #1479). From here proceeds the idea of prayers and redemptive liturgies for the souls in purgatory. St. Augustine (354-430 AD) said, "Our prayers can purge our sins and those of our beloved. Our sacrifices also can accelerate the purification in our afterlife."

Lent is about conversion, turning our lives more completely over to Christ and his way of life. That always involves giving up sin in some form. The goal is not just to abstain from sin for the duration of Lent but to root sin out of our lives forever. Conversion means leaving behind an old way of living and acting in order to embrace new life in Christ.
