# **Sacramental Information**

Baptism: at Our Lady Queen of Peace you must call the office at least 3 months in advance to arrange an appointment with the Pastor. It is assumed that the family has Our Lady Queen of Peace parish connection and practices the faith by attending Sunday Mass on a weekly basis. You may meet with the Pastor and take the course even if your child has not yet been born. Parents are expected to participate in the Baptismal preparation. At least one Godparent or both must be baptized and confirmed and are practicing Catholics. Non-parishioners are required to have a Letter of Recommendation from your Pastor to have your child Baptized in our parish.

Marriage: at Our Lady Queen of Peace because the Church is deeply concerned about each marriage, couples are asked to give a minimum of six months' notice prior to the intended date of their wedding. Church policy requires that marriages be performed in your home parish – unless you are registered and attend elsewhere.

<u>Funeral:</u> at Our Lady Queen of Peace individual arrangements with a priest. Begin by calling the parish office.

# **Development & Peace 'For Our Common Home'**

Two first-class relics will travel from Padua, Italy to Western Canada at the invitation of His Grace, Bishop Gary Gordon. The relics will visit fifteen churches in the Diocese of Victoria- Sat., Oct. 26 to Sun., Nov. 3<sup>rd</sup>, and three Catholic Schools will have the opportunity to venerate the relics of a beloved saint and Doctor of the Church. Father Mario Conte will bring the relics from Padua, Italy to North America. One reliquary contains the fragment of the saint's rib and the other reliquary contains skin of the saint's face. St Patrick's Catholic Church

Father Mario is one of fifty-one Franciscan OFM Conventual Friars who minister in the Pontifical Basilica in Padua, where the saint is buried. According to Friar Mario Conte, the Executive Editor of the Messenger of St Anthony, a magazine written, published and printed by the Franciscan Friars in Padua for the English-speaking world, "There is nothing superstitious about relics. The real meaning of a relic is love – they are a link of love between the person who venerates and the saint. In recognizing that only God performs miracles, it is through the communion of saints that we are brought closer to Our Lord." Father Alessandro Ratti explains that veneration is confirmation of two very Catholic beliefs which we recite in the Apostle's Creed: ".....the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen." Saint Anthony is ALIVE in Eternal Life in Christ in Heaven. We ask Saint Anthony to intercede of our behalf with Our Lord. As Saint John Paul II tells us, "The most beautiful and stirring adventure that can happen to you is the personal meeting with Jesus, who is the only one who gives real meaning to our lives." Pope Francis shares "The saints give us a message. They tell us: be faithful to the Lord, because the Lord does not disappoint! He does not disappoint ever, and he is a good friend always at our side."

In an address in Cologne, Germany, Thursday, August 18, 2005, Pope Benedict Emeritus said of relics "By inviting us to venerate the mortal remains of the martyrs and saints, the Church does not forget that, in the end, these are indeed just human bones, but they are bones that belonged to individuals touched by the living power of God. The relics of the saints are traces of that invisible but real presence which sheds light upon the shadows of the world and reveals the Kingdom of Heaven in our midst." Prayer petitions with holy cards will be distributed in each parish to allow parishioners to write their prayer petition and intentions to the saint. Veneration is touching the reliquaries with the prayer petition and religious objects such as rosary beads, holy cards, Holy Scripture, to name a few. The writing of a prayer petition is a worldwide tradition when venerating a relic of a saint. Father Mario will bring the petitions back to the Pontifical Basilica in Padua and place them at the tomb of Saint Anthony. The tour officially ends back at the Tomb of Saint Anthony where the Friars will gather to pray for the saint's intercession upon our intentions and petitions. # St Anthony of Padua:



Born 15 August 1195 Lisbon, Portugal Died 13 June 1231 (aged 35) Padua, Italy Anthony of Padua was a Portuguese Catholic friar belonging to the Franciscan Order. He was born and raised in a wealthy family in

Lisbon. He died in 1231 and was canonized within a year after his death, the shortest time in the history of the Church. His remains are kept in the Basilica in Padua, Italy. Noted by his contemporaries for his preaching and expert knowledge of Scripture, he was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church in 1946. St. Anthony died on June 13 in 1231. He was buried in a little church outside the walls of the town of Padua. According to the Gregorian calendar, June 13, 1231, was a Friday. Saint Anthony was buried the following Tuesday, June 17, 1231, at Santa Maria Mater Domini. It is for this reason why the nine (9) day and thirteen (13) day Saint Anthony novenas are always recited on a Tuesday.

In 1263, his remains were transferred to the newly constructed Basilica which is part of the present-day Basilica. Because of miracle activity for thirty-two years around the saint's tomb, the Minister General of the Order of Franciscan Friars Minor, Giovanni Di Fidanza, made the decision to open the saint's coffin. Friar Di Fidanza later became Saint Bonaventure. When St. Anthony's coffin was opened in St. Bonaventure's presence, bones and ashes were found. However, the saint's vocal apparatus was found to be intact and his tongue was still red and soft. At the sight of the miracle, St. Bonaventure exclaimed in awe: "Oh blessed tongue, that ever praised the Lord, and led others to praise Him! Now it is clear how great are your merits before God!"

Saint Anthony of Padua is known to millions of Catholics for lost items. Saint Anthony's reputation as a finder of

lost things dates to an incident in the saint's life. As the legend goes, a novice who had grown tired of religious life decided to leave the Franciscan community. But before leaving, the novice took Saint Anthony's psalter. The book was very important to Anthony, especially since it was before the printing press had been invented. The psalter had notes and comments he made in teaching his students in the Franciscan order. Anthony prayed that the psalter would be found and returned to him. Anthony's prayers were answered: The novice returned the psalter and returned to the order. We invite you to come and ask for Saint Anthony's intercession for more than the loss of material things, but also for loss of faith, family harmony, health, hope, peace of mind and trust in others.

# **Symbols of Saint Athony**

Through the centuries, Saint Anthony has been portrayed by artists and sculptors in various ways. He is depicted with the Holy Scriptures in his hands, with a lily or with a loaf of bread. He has been depicted in wall frescos preaching to fish, holding a monstrance with the Blessed Sacrament in front of a mule, preaching in a public square or from a walnut tree. Each presents us with an aspect of the life of our beloved Saint. Let us reflect on several of these rich symbols.

Our first symbol is St. Anthony holding the Child Jesus Since the seventeenth century, artists most often represent the Saint holding the child Jesus in his arms or with the child standing or seated on a book which the Saint is holding. This representation is rooted in the story about Saint Anthony's visit to the home of a friend. Anthony was praying in his room far into the night when suddenly the room was filled with light more brilliant than the sun. Jesus appeared to Saint Anthony in the form of a little child. His friend, awakened and attracted by the brilliant light that filled the house, was drawn with wonder to Anthony's room where he witnessed the vision. This story reflects the sense of wonder and awe Saint Anthony had for the mystery of the Lord's birth, the Word of God made flesh. In his sermons, he spoke eloquently of the humility and vulnerability of the Lord who emptied himself to become one like us in all things except sin. For Anthony, living a simple lifestyle was a way to imitate Jesus who was born in a stable and who had no place to lay his head. The call to a simple Christian lifestyle is a call we all

# Our second symbol is St. Anthony holding a lily.

Pictures and statues of Saint Anthony often portray him holding a lily. This beautiful flower has long been regarded in Christian art as a symbol of integrity of life. In many parts of the world, lilies are in bloom in the middle of June when the feast of St. Anthony is observed. The custom of associating the lily with Saint Anthony is related to two incidents. The first unusual event took place on the Saint's feast in 1680. On that day, a cut lily had been placed in one of the hands of his statue in a church in Austria and for the whole year, the flower retained its freshness and fragrance. The following year, the stalk bore two more lilies, and the church was filled with their fragrance. The second unusual event took place on the island of Corsica at the time of the French Revolution.

The Franciscans had been forced to leave the island, but the people continued to honor Saint Anthony and to invoke his aid as the friars had taught them. On his feast day, the people set up a shrine for the Saint and then decorated the Shrine with bouquets of lilies in a deserted church. Many months later, the lilies placed before Anthony's statue were found fresh and white. Each of us shares the call to make our earthly journey with integrity. Our third symbol is St. Anthony holding the Holy Scripture in his hands.

Saint Anthony is celebrated as a teacher and as a preacher. He was the first teacher in the Franciscan Order, given the special approval and blessing of Saint Francis of Assisi to instruct brother Franciscans. He was an eloquent and effective preacher, calling people back to the faith. In his sermons, he called upon his listeners to live in justice and in peace with one another. The Church calls upon us to imitate Anthony's love of the Word of God and his prayerful efforts to understand and to apply the Word of God to situations in everyday life. The Church wants us to learn from the Saint the meaning of true wisdom — to know, love, and serve the Lord.

Our fourth symbol is St. Anthony as Wonder-Worker and as Finder of Lost Things

The reason for invoking Saint Anthony's help in finding lost or stolen things is traced back to an incident in the Saint's own life. Anthony had a book of Psalms that was very important to him. Besides the value of any book before the invention of printing, his prayer book had the notes and comments he had made to use in teaching his students. A novice who had grown tired of living the Franciscan way of life decided to depart from the community. He took with him Anthony's prayer book. Upon realizing that his prayer book was missing, Anthony prayed that it would be found or returned to him. In response to Anthony's prayer, the novice was moved to return the prayer book to the Saint and to return to the Order which accepted him back. Shortly after his death, people began praying through Anthony to recover lost or stolen articles.

Our fifth symbol is St. Anthony holding a loaf of bread in his hands.

Saint Anthony is today, as he was in his lifetime, the faithful friend of all in trouble, especially the poor and the needy. "Saint Anthony's Bread" recalls the custom of giving a gift, or "bread," to the poor, or some charitable cause, as a show of gratitude for favors received as a result of prayers to Saint Anthony. This custom goes back to the year eighteen-eighty-eight (1888). At that time, there lived in Toulon, France, a devout young woman named Louise Bouffier who managed a small bakery store. One morning, Louise could not open the door to the store with her key. Neither could a locksmith, who told her he would have to break the door open. While he went to get his tools, Louise promised to Saint Anthony that she would give some bread to the poor if the door could be opened without force. When the locksmith returned, she begged him to try just once more. The door opened. Louise kept her promise and the poor received bread. This answer to Louise's prayers became known to her friends, and they imitated her example. From Toulon, this practice

spread to all parts of the world. Today, the promise to give alms in honor of Saint Anthony if a favor is granted is called "Saint Anthony's Bread."

~How To Venerate~ The Franciscans encourage people to TOUCH the reliquaries. One may touch the reliquary with their hand, any religious object such as rosary beads, prayer cards, Bibles, prayer books as well of photos of ill family members. We allow photography because the Franciscans think it is a beautiful thing to share the experience through photos with a loved one who is not able to attend. In this digital age, we also see people finding a loved one on their cell among their photos and then touching the reliquary with the cell phone ever so gently. Our relics are first class relics of the saint actually body parts of the saint. One reliquary contains a fragment of the saint's floating rib and the other contains skin layers of the saint's cheek. 2nd class relics are an object that a saint might have possessed in her or his lifetime – their habit, rosary beads or prayer book. As for a third-class relic, we pass out holy cards inside the prayer petition envelope. The prayer is a beautiful prayer to the miraculous saint which vou may recite anytime while venerating. Any religious object that you touch the reliquary with will become a third-class relic of the saint. We Catholics know that only God performs miracles. We call upon the communion of saints to intercede on our behalf to lift our prayers and petitions to God in Heaven.

A quote from Friar Alessandro Ratti from the Basilica of St. Anthony of Padua in Padua, Italy "Veneration is confirmation of two core Christian beliefs: resurrection and eternal life. "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of Saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen" We believe Saint Anthony is alive in Eternal Life with Christ in Heaven. We call upon Saint Anthony to lift our prayers to Our Lord in the Celestial Paradise."
